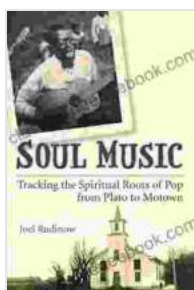
Motown

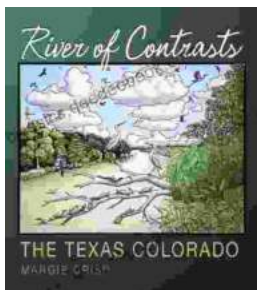
